

Four women have been arrested and charged after a random check of two teenagers' suitcases unveiled a plot to import 30kg of cocaine from Canada.

One of the teenagers told the Australian Federal Police following her arrest on Thursday that she had believed she was getting an "all expenses paid" Vancouver holiday to pick up "designer clothes".

The unsuspecting university student-turned alleged drug mule Hasna Abdula Muhamed, 18, was arrested alongside co-accused Caprice Seminara, 18, at Brisbane Airport following a weeklong trip to Vancouver.

Brisbane's Arrest Court has heard the duo had been randomly selected for examination at the airport, with inspections of their suitcases uncovering a total 30kg of cocaine of unknown purity.


An alleged teen taxi jacker was arrested in dramatic circumstances.







- But also, what is our pathway looking like? Are we identifying new talent? Where is that coming from? How can we plug them into Olympic sports?
