



- The <u>Courier Mail</u> reports barrister Peter Hastie KC will lead a review into the operations of Queensland's Parole Board after allegations parole decisions were being published online without any legislative framework. Minister for Corrective Services Laura Gerber expressed confidence in the ability of the review to deliver recommendations to restore stability and confidence in the board's operations.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> reports Treasurer Jim Chalmers has declined to intervene to increase Queensland's revenue share in the Commonwealth Grants Commission's GST carve-up despite calls from Queensland Treasurer David Janetzki. A government spokesperson said the development of communication campaigns was a longstanding practice and necessary to provide effective messaging to Queenslanders.





- Steven Miles' Budget Reply Speech was lacklustre; he reheated policies he's announced before and defended his time as Premier.
- Miles lied to 4BC listeners, saying that Adult Crime, Adult Time hasn't worked because it didn't solve all the issues of the world one month after the election, and if he didn't think the laws would work, why did he vote for the bill?
- He is a puerile, childish juvenile that is just not up to the job of Opposition Leader, or indeed, Premier before the election.
- Miles has his crayons out, and he's worried about the colour of budget documents; that's his priority, not the victims of crime.
- Our priority in the LNP Government under David Crisafulli is the same issues we talk to


